

## Sample Book Report on Oliver twist

Oliver Twist is an early 19th century novel written by Charles Dickens. It tells the story of a young orphan who escapes his miserable life at an orphanage to live with a gang of pick-pockets in London. The book was published in installments between 1837 and 1839, but it was also cutting social commentary aimed at the government's treatment of poor people at the time.

What he saw while working for Fagin leads Oliver to ask for more food than he needs so that some other child might eat. He is later sent out on errands by Fagin and he tries once again to feed some hungry children only to be captured by Mr. Bumble, the local undertaker. Bumble takes Oliver back to the workhouse where he has to work.

Oliver escapes after Mr. Bumble falls asleep, and spends some time living on the streets of London with other homeless kids who live by stealing. They are soon captured by an inspector who sends them to a new temporary orphanage in town where Oliver stays for a while before being apprenticed out to an undertaker. He grows up bitter and miserable until one day he hears someone calling his name. It is none other than Fagin, his former partner in crime, whom Oliver vows to track down when he returns home that night (Dickens).
